III. Roger Rossi

Music Magic Magazine takes great pride in presenting the very best of the music industry to our readers.

Roger Rossi is one of the proud few with a very long and distinguished music career.



Music Magic Magazine: When did you begin playing music?

Roger Rossi: I began playing trumpet in the third grade in Corning, N.Y. My father was the high school band director and anxious to start his son on an instrument. My first love was the drums, which I would bring home from the high school during the summer and teach myself how to play. I was exposed to all kinds of music but my father's first love was big band jazz. Of course he would bring home all kinds of jazz albums to include a young Maynard Ferguson, Woody Herman, Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Stan Kenton and many more. I went to bed listening to Buddy Rich, Woody Herman and Maynard Ferguson stacked on my record player(remember those?). My father steered me toward the trumpet telling me I needed to play a MUSICAL instrument. I wound up going to Fredonia State Univ. and majoring in music education. After graduating in 1970, Uncle Sam was knocking at my door. I didn't want to carry a rifle but did want to do my duty so I enlisted in the Army after winning an audition with the Army band here in Washington D.C. I began my career as a classical player playing with the Army Herald Trumpets which followed President Nixon to various high level meetings with world leaders. Hearing the Army Blues Jazz Ensemble for the first time made me realize that that's what I want to do over the long run. I proceeded to hone my improve skills and took every

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opportunity to sub with that band. Luckily, I won a spot in the band just before they became an official unit in 1972. By retiring in 2003, I am the last charter member to leave with 31 years of service with the Blues. During those 31 years I have had many wonderful experiences performing with some of my childhood heroes across the globe. Just to name a few: Clark Terry, Doc Severinson, Cat Anderson, Arturo Sanduval, James Moody, Don Menza, Joe Morello, Stan Getz, Pat Williams, Maureen McGoverin, Alabama, Bob Hope and on and on. We have performed in Japan, Australia, Norway, Sweeden, Germany and at the Matrix Jazz Festival in Switzerland.

Along with playing with the big band I have played combos on drums and trumpet at the White House and State Department for seven presidents and many world leaders. I am most proud of playing "Taps" hundreds of times for our fallen soldiers and veterans. One of the biggest events that I played for was President Clinton's first Inaugural gala. Quincy Jones produced it and we played for hundreds of thousands of people. Being on stage and looking at a sea of people was unbelievable. My most memorable concerts were tribute concerts to my childhood idols. Playing the exact chart with an outstanding band like the Army Blues was as exciting as it gets for me. Like I said before, those were the charts I was listening to when I was 13 years old. It doesn't get any better than that!!

Music Magic Magazine: Where do you think Jazz is headed as a genre? *Roger Rossi:* As far as where is jazz going in the future. There will always be a place for jazz. I know many "Rock" players who mature and want to expand their knowledge of music and head towards jazz. Look at the country and pop giants who have recorded standards albums. Why is that? It's because they realize that this is great MUSIC. They are not called standards for no reason. It's an education and maturity process to understand and appreciate Jazz. It's a challenge that will always be there. If I had to give advice to young players it would be to learn your instrument in a classic sense so you will have the foundation to build on. You have to master your instrument so you can dictate what you want to play without limitations. That is having knowledge of scales and chords and the facility and control to perform them in a musical way with a pleasant sound. Music has to be pleasing to the ear!

Music Magic Magazine: What is the most embarrassing thing that has happened to you in the music business?

Roger Rossi: I think the most embarrassed I have ever been on the stand is when I was playing drums for about 400 people at a sit down dinner and I forgot that I was about one foot off the ground on a flat stage. I was packing up my cymbals(about 8 of them) when I took a step backwards and fell off the stage. I

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tried to catch myself but I went down and all eight cymbals went up in the air and crashed onto the wooden floor with a terrific crash only to roll around the floor like tops until they stopped spinning. The whole place came to a silent hush until they figured out what happened. By that time I had crawled under the stage because I was sooo embarrassed. When the band figured out that I was OK they began laughing uncontrollably.

Music Magic Magazine: What advice would you give to music students today?

Roger Rossi: Right now I am teaching privately and have 25 students which keeps me pretty busy. I am very proud of former students who have gone on to become fine teachers and performers. I am comfortable playing classical and jazz and would recommend to upcoming students to do the same. The more versatile you are the more opportunities there are to play. Each idiom has their idiosyncrasies and the more you learn the better stylistically you can play. I have been fortunate to record CD's with the area's top musicians to include: Mark Tayler's Big Band recording Stan Kenton's Christmas arrangements, The Mike Tamaro Big Band, The Alla Carte Brass Band and many jingles for commercial spots.

Music Magic Magazine: Who are some of your favorite musicians?

Terry Dearmore: Some of my all time favorites? Well they have to begin with the greats such as Benny Goodman on clarinet, Lionel Hampton on vibes, and Toots Thielman on harmonica. Then I also like guys I personally know that others might not be familiar with like Wayne Moss of Area Code 615 and Barefoot Jerry fame on Strat and D18. He is also a famed session player on hits like Pretty Woman and Blonde on Blonde to name two. Chet Atkins used to record alot of instrumentals that Wayne wrote.

I also like my friend Jim Hochanadel, who ironically shortened his name to Jim Hoke. He is a multi-talented guy who plays reeds, woodwinds, guitars and keyboards with the best of them, but is a virtuoso in any style on the harmonica. he arranged and played on Donna Salter's album, Love Is Here.

Music Magic Magazine: Do you see a relationship between the Classical/Romantic Orchestral compositions and Jazz?

Terry Dearmore: I think some of the romantic melody strains are obviously borrowed and this is a good bridge into a rich past. There are so many great musicians who were classically trained, or who had some classical exposure, so it is not surprising that these elements would show up. Goodman, Miller, Herman, the Dorseys- on and on- used these elements in some pretty hot swing tunes, too.

Music Magic Magazine: What role do you see music is playing in today's society?

Terry Dearmore: Music is playing a greater role than ever in our sub-cultures, but not in society as a whole right now, I think. We are actually living in several cultures at once with no cohesiveness to them. The war and the administration presently in power has some effect, but American society as a whole is more

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divided into haves and have-nots. As a result, part of the culture is speaking out against perceived injustice and inequality and is just downright pissed off, while the Baby boomers are reveling in nostalgic fantasy and neoclassicism. The last time our country was this divided and isolated was, I think, right between the World Wars I & II. Ironically, Nazi Germany and Japan brought us together and the emergence of pop and swing jazz was the result.

Music Magic Magazine: What do you see is the most important aspect of musicianship?

Terry Dearmore: I think there are two important aspects for any artist to pay attention to: influences and frustrations. We as artists are always influenced by artists we admire and by the popularity of certain genre at certain times. We are naturally going to be influenced and guided to some degree by these. But a true artist also must 'scratch that itch' that he or she feels in order for true artistic expression to come out. Otherwise, it's just a copy of a copy of a copy.... One must develop one's own preferences and one's own language on his/her instrument which says, "This is how I hear it and feel it, and this is how I get satisfied."

Music Magic Magazine: Tell us about any recording projects you have been involved in and how the fans might obtain a copy of the CD.

Terry Dearmore: I have a CD set for release this spring with several original compositions

and some standards mixed in- I'm working with Jim Hoke in Nashville next week on a new tune called "Goodbye My Heart". It's the third track cut and the first tango I've ever written. It should be fun to see how Jim interprets it. What we do is, I write a song, send him a work tape with guitar and vocals, and we talk on the phone about the arrangement. Then I either go to Nashville or he sends a wave file and I go into a studio here that has pro-tools. It's pretty neat. The last project I worked on of a jazzier nature was Donna Salter's disc, "Love is Here."

Music Magic Magazine: What words of advice could you give an aspiring singer today?

Terry Dearmore: There are three things I tell any singer starting out: One, find your voicethat is, figure out what you do best, and hone your skills until you do it well. Then, two: Keep on doing' it every chance you get. Just don't say no to anything that gives you a chance to perform until you can become selective. And never. never, never give up on yourself. Always refine and grow by playing with musicians that are as good as or better than you are. Finally, get some recording time under your belt as soon and as often as possible. Recordings don't lie, and they won't flatter you. They are a true mirror. If your phrasing is off, it shows like mad. If you are flat or sharp, it hurts the ears and will not forgive like a live gig will. So own you limitations and learn to express freely within them- all the greats know this and stick to it: the freedom WITHIN your limitations.

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VI. Come See the New Strathmore Music Center By D.M. Ritchey



When you visit the Strathmore in Rockville the first thing you feel is the siege, the land hunger crowding the old estate. It started with 2,500 acres; there are 11 left. Opposing it is the culture hunger, which after a while pushed back hard. We could say that the new Strathmore Music Center is the result. And you should see it. The structure itself is worth a look for esthetic satisfaction. And then there is the art inside. The affable docent of the old manor informed me of the creeping pressures from land developers. Indeed the Rockville Pike corridor sizzles and heaves like a micro nuke. A Texas company has purchased the adjacent property, most of it a greenspace view except for the Soviet-inspired office building there, with plans to build residences. This unwelcome intelligence should concern friends and Montgomery County residents who will, I hope, lobby their council to purchase or restrict this last parcel.

With these administrative issues mentioned we can look now at these new digs. As you see, the new Strathmore Music Center is built to please. This is one way of saying the county and the Strathmore Hall Foundation spent enough to keep you coming back. The concert hall is built of blonde hardwood, and the rest of the décor is tuned to please everyone. Yet it impresses as a homey place, too. So you can drop in some evening to just watch the music people. Have a coffee or sandwich at the Prelude Cafe.

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This is on the estate built 105 years ago by a wealthy Washington family for their summer home. They named it Strathmore. Montgomery County acquired it in 1979. Far too small to serve the population which hungered for concerts, the old manor house now stays busy as a conference place, tea room, art gallery, and music room (100 seats). The Music Center is all steel and glass. It soars but is not flighty. It opened a few weeks ago, and people love it. There are dance and music classes and the concert hall seats 2,000, I believe. Any kind of music (except Hip Hop, thank the gods) is to be had here. The Strathmore has a relationship with Baltimore museums and the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, which will perform there several times a month. You can get folk and pop. In April jazzman Peter Cincotti is coming, and so are bluegrass vets The Seldom Scene. The Washington Performing Arts Society also sends troops. Scheduled to perform this spring are The Emerson String Quartet; Arturo Sandoval,

trumpeter; the Footworks Percussion Dance Ensemble, and others. This is an eclectic scene, as we like.

You might find the old manor more pleasing than the Music Center. It was well restored several years ago. Now local artists exhibit there. The works are for sale. And there is the Tea Room I mentioned, for you conversationists, you riposters and imposters. Whatever you really want, you could get it at a Strathmore Tea.

You could, for example, buy a painting and start a conversation. The worse the painting, the better. You could test your target. Ask her, for example, if she finds this is a work of abstract expressionism, or expressed abstractions. Or is it merely dada? Whatever, you can find something to do at Strathmore.

Over at the Music Center 50 meters away you can hang out in the lobby or cafe and guess where certain people are from. Are they Spanish or Venezuelan? Russian or Polish? It is a lively place. You'll see kids bouncing around the classrooms, screaming on the steps and corridors. You'll see the art addicts trolling for a fix. Many will be wearing heavy reds and blacks, the colors of pain. They are mild desperadoes. They want to be shocked and deranged-but only temporarily, safely, within the law. Go thou there, wild reader, and seize them. See <u>www.strathmore.org</u>. Then I'll see you around.

Music Magic Magazine: Who are some of your favorite musicians?

Chip Bubeck: Bobby Hutcherson Kenny Garrett Woody Shaw John Scofield Lee Morgan Clifford Brown....that's the short list anyway!

Music Magic Magazine: Do you see a relationship between the Classical/Romantic Orchestral compositions and Jazz?

Chip Bubeck: To answer this question properly I would have to have a broad working knowledge of Classical/Romantic orchestral compositions. Although I've spent time studying the scores of Beethoven String Quartets and a few Stravinsky pieces, I can't say I know enough to answer this question in an intelligent fashion - sorry.

Music Magic Magazine: What role do you see music is playing in today's society?

Chip Bubeck: Music, like any art, has always been a reflection of the society we live in. The music of today is a mirror image of the people of today. Music is more and more becoming the wallpaper of our daily lives, which makes me sad. Everywhere you go there is music, the gym, the store (any store) the dentist office...it kind of cheapens it in a way in my opinion. How many gigs have you played recently where half (or more) of the audience went about there business as if the band were invisible?

Music Magic Magazine: What do you see is the most important aspect of musicianship?

Chip Bubeck: Listening.

Music Magic Magazine: Tell us about any recording projects you have been involved in and how the fans might obtain a copy of the CD.

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Chip Bubeck: My latest CD is available on iTunes, at CD Baby, Amazon.com and through me at my website www.charlesbubeck.com. It is a group project between me and an old friend, Daniel Ian Smith.

Dan and I went to school together back in the 80's. It was recorded in Boston with a terrific band of Boston Musicians. All original compositions written by various members of the band. This band will be performing Tuesday January 8th at Blues Alley!

Music Magic Magazine: What words of advice could you give an aspiring vibes player today?

Chip Bubeck: Listen a lot - practice a lot...and don't get discouraged. Music, like life, is a journey. Don't be in such a hurry to achieve something that you don't enjoy the trip along the way.

The "Swing Dancers", Lee Robertson, Sonia Oxford, Andrew Kontola, Lisa Brannigan, John Pape, Susan Brannigan, Hilary Cairnie, Tracy Pilkerton, Tom Greco, Monica Schwartz, Carl Kirtley and Terry Flaglor add a wonderful touch of home-town talent to this Christmas variety show!

The opening number is the standard "White Christmas". On guitar is Sam Taranto, Don Lerman is on the sax, drums are by Joe

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Smith, and Jim Houck on bass.... can't tell the players without a score card!

"Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas" comes next as another instrumental and as with all of the numbers is complemented by the "Swing Dancers".

Music Magic Magazine: Who are some of your favorite musicians?

Tony Nalker: Thelonious Monk, Bill Evans, Duke Ellington, Maurice Ravel, Keith Jarrett, Leonard Bernstein, The Beatles

Music Magic Magazine: Do you see a relationship between the Classical/Romantic Orchestral compositions and Jazz?

Tony Nalker: Yes, jazz and classical music share elements of form and western harmony. A lot of jazz harmonies are not dissimilar from ones utilized by Impressionist composers (i.e. Debussy, Ravel).

Music Magic Magazine: What role do you see music is playing in today's society?

Tony Nalker: Music serves many functions. I'll just speak to the function of jazz, though. Unfortunately, jazz music is not part of the popular conscience as it was 40, 50, 60 years ago. Even though the schools have active jazz education programs across the country, which there weren't 50 years ago, our entire society just doesn't appreciate America 's most lasting and historical indigenous art form, jazz.

Music Magic Magazine: What do you see is the most important aspect of musicianship?

Tony Nalker: I think that the ability to be sensitive and versatile to each individual musical situation is vital to being a complete musician. Some of the performers/composers I admire the most are the most able to adapt to many different styles of music, like Keith Jarrett, Leonard Bernstein, Yo-Yo Ma, and Andre Previn. All these musicians are sensitive to each environment they perform in.

Music Magic Magazine: Tell us about any recording projects you have been involved in and how the fans might obtain a copy of the CD.

Tony Nalker: The Army Blues just released a 2 CD set featuring the big band and a variety of small groups. The band just celebrated its 35th anniversary and we are very excited about the upcoming year. We have a lot of performances scheduled both in this area and other venues around the country. Although these CDs are not available to the public, much of the music can be downloaded from our website: www.usarmyblues.com. This is also a good way to check out our upcoming performance schedule. I've also been on close to 200 recordings outside the army, including an excellent jazz play-along



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series published by Hal Leonard, similar to Jamie Aebersold's.

Music Magic Magazine: What words of advice could you give an aspiring piano player today?

Tony Nalker: Composing and arranging is key. It certainly adds to your marketability, but also helps crystallize your harmonic and melodic vocabulary. But even more important, be versatile. Don't turn down any jobs. Whether it's a country group, a garage band, a church gig, or classical accompaniment, take every chance you get to play. Always keep an open mind about different styles of music. As Duke Ellington said, "There are only two types of music, good and bad."

"A Touch of Class! Exactly what the Orpheus Jazz quartet delivers with an impressive, tastily, performed, entertainingly pleasing, CD menu of 10 of the best tunes ever set to music. Launching with the everfavorite swing masterpiece, Just Friends, the quartet rises immediately to the summit of musical excellence, coalescing improvisation, and smooth rhythm in the most invitingly pleasing sounds that lure one to new heights of listening pleasure culminating with that

melancholy Yesterdays. treasure. Improvisations of tenor man Troy Campbell, bassist Jim Houck, Pianist Reinhardt Liebig, and drummer Al Klopfer, are creatively intriguing, faithfully delivered in good taste, and high praise to the tunes they adorn with exciting ideas. Music backgrounds of the musicians on this CD are illuminated with high altitude experience, Campbell's resume flashes stints with The New Glen Miller band, and singer Vic Damone, to excerpt a few examples; Houck, whose bass playing sparkles with taste, technique, and earpleasing intonation, toured with the Guthrie Theater, Paula Kelly and the Modernaires; Liebig, born in Germany, struts out influences of Shearing, Tatum and Peterson; Klopfer at age 10 started drumming his way up fast, while still in high school playing with the likes of Sammy Nestico, Bill Watrous, and Earl "Fatha" Hines to name a few marquee greats.



TROY W. CAMPBELL has enjoyed a very busy musical career all of his life in and around the Pittsburgh, Pa. area. Besides the local gigs, he has toured with various musicians such as the great trumpet player Billy Butterfield, John Costa (pianist for the Mr. Rogers children's TV show), Slim Bryant and the Georgia Wildcats, The New Glen Miller Band, Vic Damone, The Jack Purcell Society Band just to name a few. Mr. Campbell has appeared on KDKA-TV for several years along with many radio stations in the Pittsburgh area. In 1968 and 1969. His Band the Troy Campbell Jazz Quartet with singing sensation, Jeannie Smith were written up in Down Beat Magazine. He also played for the world premier of the Hello Dolly movie as well as the most prestigious clubs and theaters in the east. Troy plays tenor and alto saxophones, flute, clarinet, piccolo and several stringed instruments. Mr. Campbell would like to dedicate this album to Marion his loving wife of 50 years and his father Troy W. Campbell Sr. for his inspiration and support in all his musical endeavors.

KEINHARDT LIEBIG, born in Halle, Germany, came to the USA in 1958. Lived in the Cleveland, Ohio area until 1985. Back in 1965 his Aunt Sophie brought him an accordian from Germany and he started lessons and by 1971 taught himself piano too. His interest in the piano was supplemented with three years of classical piano studies under Dr. Fredrich Koch of the Cleveland Music Settlement. By 1972, Reinhardt started getting piano gigs in saloons and restaurants in the area. From 1985 to 1998, Reinhardt lived in Phoenix, Az playing in a variety of venues such as country clubs, restaurants, hotels and coffee houses. In 1998 he and his family moved to the Washington, D.C. area, where he now is playing regularly in many venues besides his performances with the Orpheus Jazz Quartet.

AL KLOPFER began studying the drums in 1962 at ten. While still in high school he played with the big bands of Sammy Nestico and Bill Watrous, and with Earl 'Fatha'' Hines. While attending the college of William & Mary he played with the big bands of Woody Herman and Maynard Ferguson. After graduating in 1974 he spent several years in and around the Washington-Atlanta-Atlantic City corridor working with many groups and artists, which have included Kenny Burrell, Diana Krall, Michael Franks, Blood Sweat

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& Tears and Frank Sinatra, Jr. In addition, he recorded with alto saxophonist Richie Cole and his vocalist Eddie Jefferson.


